## INVASIVE SPECIES

Invasive plants are species that are not native to our region and can outcompete native and more desirable species. They offer little or no value to wildlife populations and, as they spread aggressively, become challenging problems for those managing a landscape.

Invasive species such as butterfly bush, purple loosestrife, mile-a-minute, garlic mustard, Johnson grass, burning bush, Canada thistle, tree-of-heaven, and Bradford pear should be placed in plastic bags and disposed as regular TRASH, not yard waste.

# YARD WASTE RECYCLING

## CURBSIDE COLLECTION

Woodsboro residents have yard waste collected on Thursdays during the growing season. Materials collected through this service are delivered to the County facility and so must comply with their rules for yard waste recycling. (See "Program Rules" below.)

## COUNTY DROP-OFF SITE

Yard waste can also be dropped off for no charge at the Department of Solid Waste Management's 9031 Reichs Ford Road facility. Small amounts of materials can be placed in the collection dumpster at the recycling drop-off site, and larger loads can be brought through the facility's main entrance and dropped off directly in the yard waste recycling area.

## PROGRAM RULES

- Materials processed include typical landscape and garden waste such as leaves, grass clippings, brush, shrub/hedge prunings, and limbs no larger than 6" in diameter or 6' in length.
- At the County drop-off site, materials may be loose or in paper yard waste bags. (NO plastic bags.)
- NO mulch, soil, stumps, landscape timbers, fencing, stone or hardscaping materials.
- NO invasive species (see info in sidebar).
- Per State law, self-hauled, incoming loads must be secured to prevent spillage while traveling.
